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# Why reform?

- Deep-rooted systemic challenges
- Multiple challenges complex to address as requires coordinated response across policy, profession and public
- Previous contract failures: Recurring problem, despite attempts to fix from within the system ("tinker around the edge"; "marginal gains")
- System innovation is required:
  - Society faces a challenge which requires a systemic response (access, workforce, inequalities) ie; push innovation forward
  - Society has a systemic opportunity to create a new kind of system ie; pull it forward (skill mix, digital, legislative reform)






#### Reform ambition

## System innovation

Taskperformance Aim: Reduce waiting lists, targets

Risk: Return to measuring organisational performance (inspection, regulation, targets).

Outcome: Key adaptive performance is being

**Covid response:** flexibility, agile, problem solving, skill mixing



**Opportunity:** Risk- and needs-based; prevention; personalisation; digital solutions; skill mix

Outcome: People, well-being, autonomy, retention

Objectives	Principles
What?	Aim to give practices the freedom and responsibility to look after its patient base, monitor and report the generated oral health outcomes.
How?	Reduced emphasis on individual interventions and counting procedures against targets.
Why?	Commitment to move away from UDA monitored activity towards quality oral health review for all patients
Who for?	Quality of care, monitored through ACORN data, to ensure that dental health is improving within a practice population and patient retention.
How so?	Practices with predominantly healthy dental patients encouraged to see more patients than a practice with higher levels of dental need.
What next?	The wider Dental Reform programme incorporates contract reform. System Reform will continue at pace to address access issues, inequalities and disparities in care, and workforce challenges in line with national and WG policy.
